25th Annual Naturalization Ceremony July 4, 2009 at Seattle Center

On July 4, 2009, the Ethnic Heritage Council will host the 25th Annual Naturalization Ceremony at Seattle Center, from 12noon to 1:00pm, with a concert of festive selections beginning at 11am by William Blayney and the Greenwood Concert Band. Over 500 people, from more than 75 counties, will be sworn in by U.S. Circuit Judge Richard Tallman as new citizens of the United States of America. Produced by the Ethnic Heritage Council, Seattle Center, and the United States Citizenship and Immigration Services, this is by far one of the most meaningful and moving Fourth of July events in the region and arouses great interest among friends and families of the new citizens as well as within the general community. While this is an especially important day for the many new citizens, coming from a variety of nations and cultures, it also serves to reaffirm the deeper meaning of being a citizen of the United States of America. The pub-

lic is encouraged to attend and admission is FREE.

The ceremony will include speeches by U.S. Senator Maria Cantwell, U.S. Representatives Jim McDermott & Dave Reichert and Washington State Secretary of State Sam Reed, and with Seattle City Mayor Gregory J. Nickels as Master of Ceremonies.

The Washington Army National Guard Color Guard will present the colors. During the ceremony, Native American Storyteller and performer Gene Tagaban will present a sacred story along with Swil Kanim and Peter Ali and the The Sound of the Northwest gospel choir, with director Juan Huey-Ray, will perform. All countries represented will be announced and the eldest applicant for citizenship will be introduced. The Children of the World will lead the new citizens in reciting the Pledge of Allegiance for their first time.

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Join us July 4, 2009 for the 25th Annual Naturalization Ceremony, celebrated at Seattle Center.

2009 Spirit of Liberty Award— Eduardo Mendonça

The Ethnic Heritage Council's *Spirit of Liberty Award* is given annually on the Fourth of July to a naturalized citizen who has made outstanding contributions to the United States while maintaining his/her ethnic heritage.

A native of Bahia, Brazil, Eduardo Mendonça traces his lineage to a royal African family bearing the hereditary title of Mama Beka ("prophet of the royal court"), as documented by the Instituto Geográfico e Histórico da Bahia. Brazilian music and dance are life-long passions, and his work in both his native Brazil and now the United States reflect his commitment to sharing his culture far and wide.

Growing up in a low-income district of Salvador, Bahia's capital and Bra-

zil's third largest city, home to the largest black population outside of Africa, Mendonça was among 22 high school students chosen by the Brazilian government to represent Bahian culture. The Brazilian government sent them to share the indigenous arts and culture of Bahia at fairs, conventions and other performance venues throughout Brazil and beyond. Mendonça earned his Masters in

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Arts Education from the Instituto de Música da Universidade Católica do Salvador (Music Institute of the Catholic University of Salvador), and since 1982 has taught and performed professionally in Brazil, the United States, and abroad. He also taught in the Salvadoran public schools and served as a high school principal.

Mendonça garnered international acclaim in 1991 when he was a featured performer in Paul Simon’s documentary music video, “Born at the Right Time.” In 1994, he came to Seattle by invitation to teach Brazilian culture and rhythms, and while here, was invited to perform as a percussionist-in-residence with members from the Alvin Ailey Dance

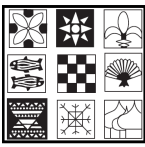
Company. The dancers were artists-in-residence at Seattle Public Schools, sponsored by Meany Hall at the University of Washington. Soon afterwards, he was granted a US performer visa to work in Seattle with the American-Trinidadian percussion

group, Bakra-Bata. He toured the US with them, and later formed his own company, Show Brazil! In 1997, he co-founded and co-directed Brasil-Fest, one of Seattle Center’s oldest cultural festivals. He continues to produce and perform in this annual festival.

He has performed for some of the world’s most well-known figures: Pope John Paul II, when the Catholic leader made his first visit to Brazil in 1982; former South Africa President Nelson Mandela in 1999; Brazilian President Jodão Baptista Figuelredo in Salvador, Bahia, 1979; and His Holiness the Dalai Lama in his historic visit to Seattle in 2008.

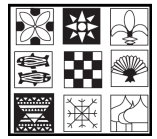

The Statue of Liberty Enlightening the World



Located on a 12 acre island, the **Statue of Liberty Enlightening the World** was a gift of friendship from the people of France

to the people of the United States and is a universal symbol of freedom and democracy. The Statue of Liberty was dedicated on October 28, 1886, designated as a National Monument in 1924 and restored for her centennial on July 4, 1986.

The Statue was a joint effort between America and France and it was agreed upon that the American people were to build the pedestal, and the French people were responsible for the Statue and its assembly here in the United States.

The French sculptor Frederic Auguste Bartholdi intended to have the statue complete in commemoration of the American Declaration of Independence. However, the statue was completed in France, July 1884, traveled by ship, and arrived at New York Harbor in June of 1885. The 350 individual pieces were reassembled in 4 months. She was the centennial gift, 10 years late!

President Grover Cleveland officially accepted the statue on behalf of the United States, as gift from France, in a dedication ceremony on October 28, 1886.

In part of the acceptance statement, Cleveland said “We will not forget that Liberty here made her home; nor shall her chosen altar be neglected”.

... did you know?

The original name for the Statue was “Liberty Enlightening the World”.

The Statue of Liberty was the largest 19th Century structure in the United States.

The Statue was designated a National Monument on October 15, 1924.

It is said that the seven spikes in the crown represent either the seven seas (Arctic, Antarctic, North and South Atlantic, North and South Pacific, Indian) or the seven continents (North and South America, Europe, Asia, Africa, Antarctica, Australia). The twenty-five windows in the crown represent the “natural minerals” of the earth. The toga represents the Ancient Republic of Rome, the torch represents enlightenment, and the chains underfoot represent Liberty (freedom) crushing the chains of slavery.

There are 354 steps (22 stories) up to the crown of the statue and 192 steps from the ground up to the top of the pedestal. Total height is 305’1” (ground to tip of torch).

The LEGO® *Statue of Liberty*, created by Dan Parker, LEGO® Certified Professional artist in 1999, stands 9’ with the pedestal. An estimated 30,000 pieces went into building Lady Liberty, including her pedestal.

She will be on display for the 4th of July in the Center House at Seattle Center. Take a close look and note even her crown and torch are lit up!

24th Annual Seafair Indian Days POW-WOW! July 17-19, at Daybreak Star Indian Cultural Center, Discovery Park.

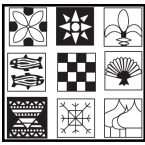

In addition to the dancers, more than

60 vendors showcasing a wide array of Native American arts and crafts which include jewelry, carvings, intricate beadwork, artwork, tapes, CD's, and T-shirts.

Naturalization is the process by which U.S. citizenship is conferred upon a foreign citizen or national after he or she fulfills the requirements established by Congress in the Immigration and Nationality Act (INA). All naturalization applicants must demonstrate good moral character, attachment, and favorable disposition.

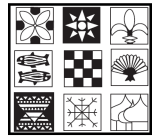
The 2009 *DANCE This* program includes over 120 performers featuring:

Mendonça and his wife, Ana Paula, are the first members of their families to immigrate to the United States, deciding to make Seattle their permanent home. Seattle, he says, is a place he felt respected and supported and where the cultural diversity he represents is highly valued. As an artist-educator, he made it his mission to contribute to his new country by bringing Brazil to the Pacific Northwest through the cultural expressions of music and dance. He sought and gained citizenship in 2004.

Currently, Mendonça teaches workshops and performs with Show Brazil!, a festive, high-energy group in demand at local festivals and schools, including Seattle's beloved and ever-popular music festivals, Folklife and Bumbershoot. He was recently appointed to the Arts Advisory Committee of King County, 4 Culture, and is a voting member of the Recording Academy, which presents the Grammys and Latin Grammys.

In addition to his work as an artist and educator, Mendonça is a proud father. His youngest son, Marcos, was born in Seattle in 1996, and his daughter Bianca attends the University of Washington - and they're also terrific performers! His 17-year-old son Eduardo Almeida Mendonça currently attends high school and is studying music in Brazil.

As a performer and educator, Mendonça's contribution is invaluable to our community and youth. "I believe the arts are an important tool in education," he says. "Exposure to art forms from different cultures fosters respect and builds a community in which difference is valued."

With his infectious smile and boundless energy, his willingness to share his culture and its music with so many, and his deep commitment to enriching the lives of everyone he meets, Eduardo Mendonça embodies the true spirit of this award.

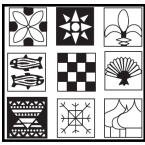

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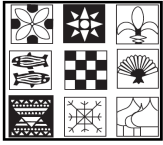
